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#### **Superintendent Message**

Dear Ripon Unified Staff and Families,

Please enjoy our 'Say Goodbye to Winter and Hello to Spring Ripon Review.' In this edition, you will find a brief snapshot of activities, events, and learning opportunities that your students have been experiencing from each of our Ripon schools from November thru this past February.

We are committed to working together with you and the community to provide a high quality education where each student will be a contributing citizen in an ever-changing diverse and global society. As such, we continue to place emphasis on continuous improvement for all. This can be seen in our ongoing work on increasing capacity regarding technology hardware, software and utilization within the classroom directly related to the teaching of instructional goals.

A secondary objective is our focus on implementation of the Multi-Tiered Support Systems (MTSS), which we received grant funding for last school year. MTSS is an integrated, comprehensive framework that focuses on core instruction, differentiated learning, student-centered learning, individualized student needs, and the alignment of systems necessary for all students to attain academic, behavioral, and social success. Components of MTSS include a strong Response to Intervention System (RtI) and Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (PBIS) both of which we now have in place as a result of the diligent and steadfast work of staff over the last few years. Assessment, progress monitoring, and data-driven decision-making are all components of a successful RtI implementation. PBIS is an approach that schools can use to improve school safety and promote positive behavior.

Additionally, this school year we have continued to focus on facilities improvement and renovation. The re-modernization of our Colony Oak School and the new construction of the Ripon High Bleacher and Press Box Project are highlights. I am pleased to share that both projects are proceeding on schedule. You may be noticing the new construction around Ripon and or the articles regarding development in Manteca that includes portions of Ripon Unified School District. These projects are sure to have a visible impact on our school district. I would like to express a special thank you to the members of the Superintendent Facility Advisory Committee (SFAC). The SFAC is comprised of parents and community members. The committee met over the course of this school year to provide the district with facility recommendations in the next steps of addressing our facility master plan needs for the future.

We appreciate all that you do for your children and all of your efforts to support us as we keep striving in this ever-changing climate of limited resources in order to provide your student(s) with the best educational opportunities possible.

1<sup>st</sup> grade performed at the January assembly for the entire school. They shared several examples of all of the fun and exciting things they have learned in the first 100 days.






Seventh grade students participated in several STEAM activities over the past few weeks. Students recently concluded their castle projects. Each student researched a castle of their choice, built a model, and gave a presentation to the entire class. On Wednesday, they presented their castles to the entire student body. The students did an awesome job and really enjoyed the activity.





In science seventh grade students dissected flowers. This experiment allowed students to identify different parts of a flower, such as the pistil, stamen, petals, stem, and sepal and to understand each parts function. They also learned the importance of pollen for plant reproduction. This is a great hands on engaging way to study science.





Second grade students conducted research on force and motion with magnets. Students worked in small groups to explore what materials were attracted by the magnet and the difference between attraction and repel.



Valley Days at the Historical Museum of San Joaquin County was a big hit this month for 5<sup>th</sup> graders. They travelled back in time to the 1880s and learned how to live just like the pioneers. They participated in the following: blacksmithing, branding, rope-making, baking, tinning, leather making, printing, and laundering.





Dedicated volunteer parents and some staff were trained to teach these pioneer skills to the students. The pioneer skills that the kids learned were a simulation of colonial times as well. It was a huge success and the kids really enjoyed themselves.

Construction work got into full swing this past trimester. The new septic system and test well have been completed. Some of the things they are currently working on are the underground utilities, the classrooms pads, and pre-framing of the walls. The process is exciting to watch. Students and staff are amazed by how their old playground is being transformed into their new school. If construction stays on schedule, we will be in our new classrooms by the end of 2018!

#### **Harvest High**

Harvest High School students and staff have seen such growth and productivity fostered by a supportive, hardworking staff and determined students. Seven students have graduated early and will be participating in the graduation ceremony with the remaining students in May. The Positive Behavior System (PBIS) has been assessed and refined throughout the quarter and has helped to decrease the number of tardies, detentions and suspensions. The teacher-student mentorships have helped bolster students' understanding of what they need to accomplish to fulfil their goals and build relationships on campus. The climate of the school is cheerful and the students exude a sense of accomplishment for their efforts thus far.

Students have made huge strides in their credits recovery efforts and their direct instruction courses have continued to address the common core standards through a more engaging atmosphere. Students have created vignettes, carried out STEM activities related to the graphing of linear equations, studied different economic models of countries around the world and many more exciting topics.



Harvest High opened up a small student store that has really sparked a buzz around campus. Students were very excited to see what the store had to offer and what their Positive Behavior Intervention System points would buy them and how they could maximize their points.





Harvest High students had the pleasure of visiting the Forensic Science Lab better known as the "crime lab" located here in Ripon. Students were given a tour and exposed to the different types of careers available to them such as criminalist, clerical positions, managerial, etc. The first criminalist took us to his lab and presented on how analysis of weapons was done for criminal cases. He also debunked myths regarding what everyone sees on television. We then moved onto the blood lab where they showed us a breathalyzer and explained its function and accuracy. We finished up the tour in the lab pertaining to narcotics. Throughout the entire tour students asked questions regarding particular jobs, required training/schooling and clarification on federal/state laws. Students felt it was an interesting place and offered a variety of career opportunities.





Harvest students had the pleasure of visiting Modesto Junior College (MJC) and learn about all the programs MJC has to offer. They were introduced to fire science, the nursing program, medical assisting certification, and respiratory therapy just to name a few. They also had an inspiring presentation regarding their future. MJC representatives will be coming on campus to help students register, file their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and take their placement exams.



Harvest High had another wonderful visit from San Joaquin Delta College who sent out Marisol Jacquez Hernandez, the Marketing and Outreach Specialist. Marisol inspired students with her personal story and all the wonderful opportunities Delta College has to offer. She encouraged students to strive for their goals and to not let any circumstance be an excuse for continuing their education. Harvest students will do a Delta College visit in March.

Harvest High School continues to build relationships and work on their Positive Behavior Intervention System (PBIS) through a third field day of the school year. This time, the students played badminton and bonded over the difficulty of the game and the amazing skills that some students possess. Students also attended the annual Ripon Almond Blossom Festival and a couple even marched in the parade.







The students at Harvest High voted Mrs. de la O as their staff member of the quarter. Mrs. de la O is the site secretary, which entails running the daily operations of the school. Some of her regular tasks include daily attendance, answering phones, calling parents, ordering breakfast and lunches, running reports, helping students, teachers and the principal. As one student phrased it, "she does everything for us and without her this school wouldn't run as smooth as it does now."

Mrs. de la O is in her fourth year at Harvest High and one student summed her up beautifully by stating, "she puts 100% into what she does and you can tell she is passionate about what she does. #### **Park View**

This second trimester has been full of wondrous events at Park View. STEAM (Science, Technology, Arts, Math) is part of Park View's commitment to learning, and as such, we would like to showcase some of our adventures.

Our third and fourth grade students participated in the Link Up program. Link Up is a program of Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute, which pairs orchestras with students in grades 3–5 at schools in their local communities to explore orchestral repertoire through a hands-on music curriculum. On March 7<sup>th</sup>, our students participated in a culminating concert, in which they sang and played recorders with

the orchestra from their seats. Our students discovered how music through the orchestra moves. While preparing for our March performance, our third grade classes had a delightful time as they were treated to recorder classes by our very own musical expert, Dr. Ziggy Robeson. Mrs. Goeppert's and Ms. Ruiz's classes were excited to have her join them, as they explored harmony and musical notes. 








In addition to animal reports, second grade students also studied maps. They finished their unit on Fairy Tales and mapped out all of the places they visited including roads and points of interest.
